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
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Dear Master Gardeners-

Below are important details about the Master Gardener (MG) program for March for 1) 2014 MG trainees and 2) Veteran MG volunteers.

1) 2014 MG trainees

As the classroom component of the MG program winds down, it is time to plan your volunteer experience. There are many *hands-on* opportunities for you to both share your gardening knowledge with the community and also get your hands dirty.



- 1. Primary Service Volunteer Opportunities (Part I)
- 2. Support Service Volunteer Opportunities (Part II).

For new trainees, we ask that you complete 66 total hours of volunteer service and document your time (we will provide a form) by October 1, 2014. Of these hours, we recommend that you spend at least 26 hours in "Primary" activities, which are volunteer activities that directly support the outreach mission of OSU by answering client questions at our phone clinics, farmers' markets, and other events in the community.

Many of the Primary volunteer activities require a specialized training in order for you to volunteer. If you plan to participate in any of these activities, please sign up for the trainings on CERVIS (secure online event management system) or at the resource fairs (we will enter you into CERVIS).

- Multnomah County Phone Clinic
- Washington County Phone Clinic
- International Rose Test Garden Clinic/Tour
- Oregon Zoo Backyard Makeover Clinic
- Pittock Mansion Clinic/Tour

Please note: you can count your time for the required trainings.

Many Primary volunteer opportunities including our three phone clinics, farmers' markets, and numerous one-time events will be posted on CERVIS and we will **open registration to these events for new trainees on Friday, March 7th at 5pm.** Thus, all new trainees will have seen our brief training for CERVIS at the resource fairs and equal opportunity to register for volunteer slots.

Please be respectful of other volunteers and only sign up for three shifts of any particular event. Later in the season, you can fill in open slots for activities that you really like. We encourage you to try out a wide range of Primary volunteer activities and keep in mind that you will learn a lot through this type of volunteer opportunity.

For Support Activities, you will be able to register for shifts directly at the resource fairs. You can also contact event coordinators directly (see Support Service Volunteer Opportunities (Part II) handout from the resource fair) to sign up for Support activities.

2) Veteran MG volunteers

Primary volunteer activities on CERVIS

Thank you, Vets, for your ongoing volunteerism with the Master Gardener (MG) program! We, the OSU Extension Service MG program team (Weston, Pukhraj, Jordis, and Margaret), look forward to your participation in 2014 and strive to serve your needs as a volunteer.

New for the 2014 Master Gardener outreach season, we are using a secure online registration system (CERVIS) to coordinate "Primary" volunteer activities organized by the MG program office. Primary events include the phones, farmers' market clinics, and other activities where MG volunteers provide gardening information to the public. These events are currently set up on CERVIS and open for you to register. We are keeping track of Vet and 2014 trainees shifts separately to ensure that trainees on each clinic shift are supported with a veteran MGs' gardening knowledge, understanding of MG program procedures and kind disposition!

After logging in you will see all the events (no event code needed to access Farmers markets etc.). In case you don't know or forgot your CERVIS password you can click on "Don't Know Password/Reset Password" option on the login page (see below the "Login to CERVIS" button). An email will be sent to you immediately with a temporary password. When you use that temporary password to login, you will be prompted to set your own new password. Remember this password for future logins.

Also, if you want to branch out and try some new primary activities, **many of the Primary volunteer activities require a specialized training** in order for you to volunteer. If you plan to participate in any of these activities, please sign up for the trainings on CERVIS or at the resource fairs. These primary activities are listed in the Primary volunteer activities on the previous page. You can count your time for the required trainings.

Please note, OSU paperwork was needed by 2/18/2014 to volunteer in 2014. If you have not met this deadline, we have disabled your CERVIS profile such that you cannot volunteer for Primary activities. Support activity coordinators will be provided a list of the volunteers who have turned in paperwork and can volunteer at their activity/event. Spring recertification for veteran MGs

Unfortunately, we were unable to book PCC Rock Creek this spring for MG recertification. Thus, we are not going to provide two recertification events in 2014. We plan to hold one event on November 15 at PCC Rock Creek. Based on this situation, here are the opportunities to accrue the 12 hours of recertification this year:

- Attend any remaining MG training classes (3 hours credit per morning or afternoon session).
- Attend chapter meetings and other trainings that are approved for recertification credit (see below))(upcoming recertification trainings for each month are listed in our MG newsletter, www.metromastergardeners.org/newsletter).
- Attend the fall recertification training and any combination of the above.
- We will make a recertification test available in April and you can complete that and send it back to the MG program office. Stay tuned for details.

• If you are six hours short on recertification credit for 2014 due to just one event being available, please submit the recertification details that you have completed and we will waive the requirement for six of the hours, since we are not offering both spring and fall recertification.

Thank you for your patience with this change in how we have traditionally offered recertification training. Our efforts to secure facilities for 250+ people can be challenging!

Fruit Tree Grafting: Bench Grafting and Top Working

Grafting fruit trees lets us mix-and-match genetics to create a custom fruit tree that can best meet our needs. Most every fruit tree is grafted, meaning it is made up of two different sets of genetics (one for the type of fruit, another for the tree's root-size). Come explore the theory and potential behind grafting, and learn how to do it yourself! In both the lecture and hands-on portions of the class, we will cover grafting small new trees, as well as how to graft new varieties onto older existing trees. Each participant will have

March Garden Calendar

Produced by OSU Extension, each month provides reminders of key garden chores, such as fertilizing, pest control, planting, and maintenance.

Recommendations in this calendar are not necessarily applicable to all areas of Oregon. For more information, contact your local Extension office.

Sustainable gardening

The Oregon State University Extension Service encourages sustainable gardening practices.

Preventative pest management is emphasized over reactive pest control. Identify and monitor problems before acting and opt for the least toxic approach that will remedy the problem. The conservation of biological control agents (predators, parasitoids) should be favored over chemical controls.

Use chemical controls only when necessary and only after thoroughly reading the pesticide label. First consider cultural, then physical and biological controls. Choose the least-toxic options (insecticidal soaps, horticultural oils, botanical insecticides, and organic and synthetic pesticides — when used judiciously).

Planning

- Plan your vegetable garden carefully for spring, summer, and fall vegetables that can be eaten fresh or preserved. If you lack in-ground gardening space, plan an outdoor container garden.
- Use a soil thermometer to help you know when to plant vegetables. Some cool season crops (onions, kale, lettuce, and spinach) can be planted when the soil is consistently at or above 40 degrees Farenheit.

Maintenance and Clean Up

- Lawn mowing: Set blade at 0.75 to 1 inch for bentgrass lawns; 1.5 to 2.5 inches for bluegrasses, fine fescues, and ryegrasses.
- Compost grass clippings and yard waste, except for clippings from lawns where weed-and-feed products or herbicides (weed killers) have been used.
- Spread compost over garden and landscape areas.
- Prune gooseberries and currants; fertilize with manure or a complete fertilizer.
- Fertilize evergreen shrubs and trees, only if needed. If established and healthy, their nutrient needs should be minimal.
- If needed, fertilize rhododendrons, camellias, and azaleas with acid-type fertilizer. If established and healthy, their nutrient needs should be minimal.
- Western Oregon: Prune spring-flowering shrubs after blossoms fade.
- Western Oregon: Fertilize caneberries using band fertilizer, broadcast fertilizer or a complete fertilizer or manure



Planting/Propagation

- Divide hosta, daylilies, and mums.
- Use stored scion wood to graft fruit and ornamental trees.
- Plant insectary plants (e.g. Alyssum, Phacelia, coriander, candytuft, sunflower, yarrow, and dill) to attract beneficial insects to the garden. For more information, see <u>Encouraging Beneficial Insects in Your Garden</u> (PNW550).
- Central Oregon: Sow chard seeds outdoors. Plant seed flats of cole crops (cabbage, cauliflower, broccoli, and Brussels sprouts) indoors or in a greenhouse.
- Western Oregon: If soil is dry enough, prepare vegetable garden and plant early cool-season crops (carrots, beets, broccoli, leeks, parsley, chives, rhubarb, peas, and radishes). Plant onions outdoors as soon as the soil is dry enough to work.
- Western Oregon: Plant berry crops (strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, blackberries, currants, gooseberries, and other berry-producing crop plants). See <u>OSU Extension publications</u> for berry varieties.



Pest Monitoring and Management

- Western Oregon: Monitor for European crane fly and treat lawns if damage has been verified.
- Spray trees and shrubs for webworms and leafrollers, if present.
- Protect new plant growth from slugs. Least toxic management options include barriers and traps. Baits are also available for slug control; use with caution around pets. Read and follow all label directions prior to using baits or any other chemical control.
- Learn to identify the predatory insects that can help keep aphids and other pests under control.
- Spray to control leaf and twig fungus diseases in dogwood, sycamore, hawthorn, and willow trees.
- Prune ornamentals for air circulation and to help prevent fungus diseases.
- **Western Oregon:** Start rose blackspot control tactics at budbreak. Control rose diseases such as black spot. Remove infected leaves. Spray as necessary with registered fungicide.
- Monitor landscape plants for problems. Don't treat unless a problem is identified.

Houseplants and Indoor Gardening

- Trim or shear heather when bloom period is finished.
- Start tuberous begonias indoors.
- **Western Oregon:** Take geraniums, begonias, and fuchsias from storage. Water and fertilize. Cut back if necessary. Move outdoors next month.

But if you want your harvest also to include tomatoes, eggplants, cucumbers, and peppers, it pays to approach the growing season with a definite plan and a few simple tricks to maximize summer heat.
